(1.25)	Accepted	Under the existing contract, GEOAmey manage the use of restraints as a standard approach set out in standard operating procedure (SOP) 059. The SOP dictates the level of handcuffing required by areas and was introduced to reduce the risk of escapes. GEOAmey have recently introduced an individual risk-based approach to handcuffing to support social distancing during the COVID-19 pandemic. This is in line with the changes that will be introduced under the Generation 4 contract which is due to commence at the end of August 2020, whereby the use of restraints will be based on individual risk assessments. This will ensure that restraints are only applied when necessary whilst safety and security is maintained. The service has recently featured in the 'WOU', a weekly notice informing all staff of the importance and value of this service including a guide of when and how to use the service. Cordless telephones have been purchased to make the service more accessible and a monthly report on each courts use is provided to the GEOAmey Managers so as they can monitor uptake. (4.50)	Accepted	During the daily opening checks, GEOAmey staff check all cells for offensive graffiti and any ligature points. Cells are taken out of action if they contain any graffiti that is offensive, racist, sexual or homophobic. This is reported to HMCTS for cleaning. Cells are also checked for potential ligature points and any identified are reported to HMCTS and if necessary cells can be taken out of action. However ligature points form only part of the risk process and should be considered in conjunction with the overall risk process for each individual, ensuring that those most at risk are located in the safest accommodation. Through the local Stakeholder meetings, a review of the HMCTS key check & test document will be used to drive forward improvements. HMCTS Operations Managers are working up a schedule regarding deep clean of cells. The action plan will detail the approach to ligature points and graffiti.
