





Custodial population Children from black, Asian and minority ethnic backgrounds make up **82%** of all children in custody.¹

Use of remand

In the year ending March 2020, BAME children were even more over-represented among those in custody while on remand.

Black children had the highest rate of reoffences at 2.26.

White children had a rate of 2.00 and Mixed children 1.75.







Of the Looked After Children open to Haringey Youth Offending Service in April 2020¹, **71%** were Black despite making up 47% of the local Looked After Children population.

Due to relatively low numbers of yp breached and the annual swing of rates below it is difficult to draw any meaningful conclusion. Important to note that only 10 young people were breached in 2019/20. In 2018/19 black young people were 3.7 times more likely to be breached²
